SYNOD OF THE NORTHEAST

SINODO PRESBITERIANO BORIQUEN DE PUERTO RICO

Hurricane Maria struck the island of Puerto Rico on September 20, 2017. The infrastructure; communications, transportation, power and water plants on the island were destroyed. Initial and church damage grants for the Presbyteries of the Noroeste and Suroeste were sent to the Synod for distribution as an emergency special action. PDA Advisory Committee, appointed by the GA, acted to suspend the PDA guidelines on emergency grant funding. In December an initial community damage grant was issued to the Synod to assist the communities outside of the presbyteries on the eastern portion of the island. In the Presbytery of San Juan over 15 churches were damaged, in the Presbytery of the Southeast over 29 churches and in the Presbytery of the Northeast over 30 churches were damaged.

PDA NATIONAL RESPONSE TEAM

The Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) National Response Team (NRT) members represent PDA following a disaster in the United States. They provide support, long-term recovery and compassion fatigue training, and provide emotional and spiritual care to affected presbyteries and synods as they assess the impact of the disaster on both the church and the community. They also assist in connecting presbyteries to local, regional and national resources. In 2017, NRT spend approximately 2,122 days in the field in 70 Presbyteries. The NRT assisted with disaster recovery in at least 38 states (including Washington D.C. and Puerto Rico) to natural and human caused disasters in 2017 and assisted in long-term recovery for disasters dating back from 2012. 35 NRT were deployed to lead trainings and workshops throughout the country.

PDA HOSPITALITY PROGRAM

The Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) Hospitality Program became a permanent program area in 2012 in response to requests from mid-councils and local congregations to provide hospitality to volunteer work teams following disasters. A network of trained hospitality volunteers works with the mid-councils and partner agencies to assess hosting sites and help determine the hospitality model that will best match their facility to the recovery coordination. In 2017, more than 7,000 work team volunteers served through 34 PDA-related volunteer hosting sites in 13 states. Of these 34 host sites, the PDA National Call Center managed calendars for 22 host sites that housed volunteers donating more than 200,000 hours of labor for disaster recovery. The monetary equivalence of this labor is valued at over \$4.8 million; however, as the church we know the value of our service is not limited to financial support—by bearing the witness of Christ's love, our gifts of service are multiplied.

PDA STORY MINISTRY

Story Productions is a ministry that connects, engages and equips congregations and communities through the medium of Story. These award-winning documentary resources are available to congregations and communities to organize screenings and host conversations about important and timely issues. In 2017 PDA released *To Breathe Free*, short documentary and winner of "Best Documentary Short" at the Covellite International Film Festival 2017:

"Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free." *To Breathe Free* follows the 5-year journey of a Syrian family fleeing the war in Homs to the refugee camps in Jordan and starting a new life in Washington, D.C. Using home movies, phone video, family photos and interviews with family members and former refugees, this short documentary gives an intimate and unique perspective not seen in current media reporting on the refugee crisis. To Breathe Free captures the intersection of individual narratives from a family fleeing the Vietnam War in 1970, to the Syrian Conflict in 2017, to the families who help create a new home in our nation's capital, giving voice to our common humanity and the struggle that binds people together.
