

Carlton serves as the Coordinator for the Office of Vital Congregations for the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. He previously served as Chief Operations Officer for Johnson C. Smith Theological Seminary. Carlton recently completed a two-year residency in Chaplaincy with Grady Health Systems where he developed a specialty in Emergency and Trauma Initiated Palliative Pastoral Care.

Carlton is an associate minister at the First Afrikan Presbyterian Church in Lithonia, GA where he leads the Ujima Men's Fellowship, Kijana Boys Rites of Passage, Fawohodie Ministry to the Incarcerated and their families, and serves in music ministry. He is a board member of the First Afrikan Presbyterian Church Community Development Corporation, the Presbyterian Pastoral Care Network and NEXT Church (Strategic Planning Team). He is a regular contributor to the Presbyterian Outlook monthly magazine.

Even if a class is in session, you can enter the chapel lobby and look through the windows into the chapel itself, to see the large fresco  $(16' \times 17')$  on the front wall from a distance. (12:30-1:00 pm is the time you are most likely able to enter the chapel itself and be closer to view the painting.)

# Conference



Rev. Gregory J. Bentley was born in Thomasville, AL on October 30, 1969 to Juanita Bentley and William Thomas, Jr. He was raised in Pine Hill, AL in an extended family household, which included his mother, Juanita; his grandmother ("Mama"), the late Virginia Howze; his great aunt ("Nannie"), the late Estella Black; and his grandfather ("Daddy"), the late Aubry Howze.

Rev. Bentley was baptized and raised in the Saint Paul Primitive Baptist Church. He graduated from Pine Hill High School in 1986 and matriculated at Stillman College, in Tuscaloosa, AL. It is the only HBCU founded by the "Southern" Presbyterian Church (PCUS). During his time at Stillman College, he joined the Brown Memorial Presbyterian Church and answered his call to the ministry.

In addition to being raised in a Christian home, Rev. Bentley's sense of call was heavily influenced by his college mentor, Dr. C.H. Thomas, a member of the religion faculty and an ordained Presbyterian minister. Dr. Thomas taught him that a minister must have "the learning and the burning." Convinced of the importance of seminary training, after receiving the Bachelor of Science degree in Biology from Stillman College in 1990, he matriculated at the Interdenominational Theological Center in Atlanta, GA from which he received the Master of Divinity degree in 1995. He continued his studies at Auburn University in Montgomery, AL and graduated with the Master of Education degree in 1997. He was ordained at the Northern

Heights Presbyterian Church in Selma, AL on November 30, 1997 and led a bivocational career of pastoring and teaching Biology and physical science in the public school system until he came to Brown Memorial Presbyterian Church in Tuscaloosa, AL, in 2001. He was called to the pastorate of the Fellowship Presbyterian Church in Huntsville, AL on January 1, 2012.

Rev. Bentley has served in various capacities in political and civic affairs, including a term as chairman of Minority Affairs for the Tuscaloosa County Democratic Party. He is a member of Leadership Tuscaloosa, Goshen Lodge #530 (Prince Hall), and a Life member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc.

Rev. Bentley contends, "The church is a hospital for sinners and not a museum for saints. It is a vanguard and repository of our noblest aspirations, traditions and values. In addition to the Black Church, the Black Family and the Black School must be mission priorities if we are to fully develop our potential as a people."

Rev. Bentley enjoys good music...from Beethoven to Bessie Smith to BDP to Bluegrass. He also likes to read and play chess. He lives in Huntsville, AL with his wife, Diann, and his daughters, Miriam and Johari.

Robyn is a graduate of Trinity University in San Antonio with a bachelor's in speech communication and Spanish. She earned her M.Div. from Wake Forest University School of Divinity, and her D.Min from Brite Divinity School in Fort Worth.

- All people are safe to bring their whole selves
- All questions are celebrated as much as answers
- Inclusion, integration, and love are the norm

Pepa is also an accidental camp director as the co-founder of kin-dom camp, a fully affirming camp for LBGTQIA+ youth. Pepa is a lifelong Presbyterian and lives with her wife and dogs in McKinney, TX.

## Calling In: A Conversation Addressing Harm to, and Cultivating Spaces for Celebration of, the LBGTQIA+ Community

Explore ways that our denomination has been active in harming the LBGTQIA+ community and the ways that harm is still happening. You are invited to wonder what allyship could look like in your own life and the importance of prioritizing relationships from the understanding that we belong to one another as the body of Christ. # Keynote Speaker



Rev. Shanea D. Leonard (they/them) is a pastor, teacher, consultant, community activist, and abolitionist. Shanea has been an ordained minister in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) for over fourteen years. A native of Philadelphia, they received their B.A. from the University of Pittsburgh and M.Div. from Pittsburgh Theological Seminary with a focus in urban ministry. They currently carry out their justice mandate as the national Coordinator for Gender & Racial Justice for the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) in the Presbyterian Mission Agency. Shanea has been serving communities and congregations in various capacities for nearly twenty years. Rev. Leonard has done extensive work within urban areas to eradicate systemic oppression in the intersections of race, gender, sexual orientation, and socio-economic despair. Shanea has worked extensively with local governments, social service agencies, universities, faith communities, and across international borders in a commitment to liberation for marginalized people. They have also spent time doing international outreach in Africa, Mexico, and the Dominican Republic. Shanea believes that God has given them a burden for people whom others have disregarded, oppressed, forgotten, or simply don't even see.

A justice warrior, Shanea is the founder & former pastor of JUDAH Fellowship, which at its height, was western Pennsylvania's only predominantly Black affirming faith

community. While in Pittsburgh, Rev. Leonard was a leading revolutionary voice of systemic change in the work of jail reform, LGBTQIA inclusion, racial justice, & civic well-being. Shanea has served several other organizations including being the chair of Pittsburgh's LGBTQIA+ Advisory Council and chair of one of the nation's leading reproductive justice organizations. Pastor Leonard is an often-quoted media contributor and an active, outspoken faith voice for justice. Most recently, Rev. Leonard was the chief architect for the PC(USA) international Week of Action and author of the Radical Welcome chapter of the new PC(USA) evangelism manual, "8 Habits of Evangelism," among other publications within and outside of the denomination.

Rev. Leonard has received numerous awards for their work in reproductive justice, leadership, queer education, and racial freedom. Shanea resides in Louisville, Kentucky but travels extensively for the cause of liberation of marginalized people. They live their life by the affirmation of Assata Shakur which states, "...it is our duty to fight for our freedom. It is our duty to win... we have nothing to lose but our chains!" And the scriptural passage of Micah 6:8 which states, "The Lord has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the LORD require of you? To do justice and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." In their spare time, Shanea prides themselves on being an amateur DJ, comedian, pretty good chef, and godparent to 5 wonderful children!

God calls us to be in covenant relationships and covenant ministries: To love and care, to share and clothe, to feed and nurture, to counsel and teach, to be committed to the health and well-being of our communities. We are called to be the living church in the world. The Church is the body of Christ, beyond these walls. We go in faith to minister in hospitals, prisons, schools, high rises, business centers, city centers, rural and urban spaces, in places where people are gathered or scattered we go. Amen.\*

- What is the core message of this scripture?
- Identify the conflict in the narrative.
- In what ways does this scripture impact you/reflect your own experiences?



#### Activity (15 min)

Consider how we need to address our own trauma, invisibility, harm, exclusion—as individuals and as communities—in order to heal and move forward in hope. How can we address our own wounds, so we are in a better place to then provide a true and radical welcome to others? Can we settle our bodies, acknowledge our experiences of hurt or exclusion, and at some level and in some ways, give them over to God?

Hold the stone from the retreat box in your hand. Breathe into any feelings that emerge in your heart and body. In your imagination, or with the provided marker, write on the rock the experiences you'd like to no longer hold power over you, something from the past that you'd like to let go. When you're ready, take a walk and find a spot to literally leave the stone—and the represented burden. Allow this to free up space in yourself to receive God's grace and to be a vessel for God's radical welcome of self and others. (If you are attending the conference in person, you may also choose to leave your stone at the wailing wall inside Convocation Hall.)

Note: Both virtual and in-person groups will end this session once individuals are dismissed for their prayer walk/stone release.



## Why Evangelism?


