Rev. Kerri N. Allen, MRTI chair, Advocacy Committee on Women’s Concerns rep, is a Reformed and womanist theologian, PhD student, and hospital chaplain. In 2010, Kerri moved to Chicagoland to serve as a Lilly Pastoral Resident at the Fourth Presbyterian Church of Chicago. Prior to responding to a call in ministry, Kerri had a first career in politics, serving as a political appointee at multiple levels of government, including serving as a legislative assistant in the United

States Senate with an expertise in healthcare policy. Now, as a student in theology and ethics at Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary, Kerri uses her diverse experiences to focus on disparities in quality of healthcare for Black women in the United States. Originally from St. Paul, MN when Kerri is not buried in a book or writing a paper, she enjoys hiking, travel, watching sports, cooking or spending time with one of her many nieces or nephews.

Rev. Dr. Dee Cooper: Dee is the Lead Presbyter for Denver Presbytery. She is the former Gap Presbyter of Coastlands Presbyter (New Jersey) and Interim Executive Presbyter for Heartland Presbyter. She is also a Certified Coach through the Hendricks Institute. She is a License Clinical Marriage and Family systems therapist and a faculty member of the Restoring Resourcefulness program. Dee serves on the Presbyterian Mission Agency Board and is the moderator for the Presbyterian Mental Health Network. Dee has presented and facilitate many national workshops for the denomination, presbyteries, synods, churches and numerous AF bases around the US. Dee is the Director of MALT (Mid America Lincoln Trails) Transitional/ Interim Presbytery Leader Certification. Rev. Dr. Lindley Grant DeGarmo, MRTI vice-chair, Board of Pensions rep, serves as Interim Pastor of Union Church of Pocantico Hills, a non-denominational congregation in Tarrytown, NY. An Honorably Retired minister member of Hudson River Presbytery and Synod of the Northeast, he served prior to his retirement as Pastor and Head of Staff for Towson Presbyterian Church, in the Presbytery of Baltimore and Synod of the Mid-Atlantic.

Before entering the ministry, Dr. DeGarmo was Director of the Global Independent Power Group at Salomon Brothers. He also worked for Exxon Corporation and its affiliates in corporate finance and strategic planning functions. His first congregational assignment was as Interim Associate Pastor for First Presbyterian Church in the City of New York, Presbytery of New York City, Synod of the Northeast.

Dr. DeGarmo earned a Bachelor of Arts, magna cum laude, from Princeton University; a Master of Public Affairs from Princeton's School of Public and International Affairs; a Master of Divinity from Union Theological Seminary, New York City; and a Doctor of Ministry from Princeton Theological Seminary. He and his wife, Sarah Finlayson, have a daughter, Ellie, who is pursuing joint law and public health degrees from Georgetown University (JD) and Johns Hopkins University (MPH).



Rev. Dr. Mark Douglas, Advisory Committee on Social Witness Policy rep, is an ordained teaching elder in the Presbyterian Church (USA) and Professor of Christian Ethics at Columbia Theological Seminary in Decatur, GA, where he directs the Master of Theology degree program. He is the founding editor of *@ this point: theological reflections on church and culture*, the seminary's online journal, and the author of *Confessing Christ in the 21st Century* (Rowman and Littlefield, 2005), *Believing Aloud: Reflections on Being Religious in the Public Sphere* (Cascade, 2010), *Christian Pacifism for the Environmental Age* (Cambridge University Press, 2019), and a forthcoming book, *Modernity, the Environment, and the Just War Tradition*. His current work explores connections between violence and climate change at the beginning of the Anthropocene.



Rev. Fairfax F. Fair, Board of Pensions rep, is the pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Pasadena, Texas. She has been an ordained Minister of Word and Sacrament for over thirty years and has served congregations in Tennessee, Kentucky, and Michigan, as well as Texas. She is a graduate of Union Presbyterian Seminary (M. Div.) and Columbia Theological Seminary (D.Min.). Dr. Fair served as Chair of the Board of Directors for the Board of Pensions of the PCUSA and on the Board of Trustees for Union Presbyterian Seminary. Other previous service includes Moderator of the Presbytery of New Covenant, commissioner to the General Assembly, board member for The Presbyterian Outlook, Medical Benevolence Foundation, Texas Presbyterian Foundation, Presbyterian Homes and Services of Kentucky, SafeHouse (domestic abuse and assault shelter), and on the State Bar of Texas Disciplinary Review Board.

Rev. Dr. Elizabeth Hinson-Hasty, member-at-Large, is Professor of Theology, Chair of the Department of Theology, and Director of the Peace Studies program at Bellarmine University. Her research interests include economic ethics, social gospel theology, feminist theology, and recovering the work of neglected women theologians. Her most recent book, *The Problem of Wealth: A Christian Response to a Culture of Affluence* (Orbis, 2017), was awarded first place by the Catholic Press Association for the best book related to Catholic Social Teaching. She will be undertaking a new book project in 2019 entitled *Seeking More than Dutiful Love: God's Healing in the Context of Families Affected by Mental Illness*. She is a Minister of Word and Sacrament in the Presbyterian Church (USA) and has served on several advocacy committees for her denomination, including ACWC and the Resolution Team drafting the Social Creed for the Twenty-first Century. Among other awards and academic honors, she is the recipient of the

Louisville Institute's Sabbatical Grant for Researchers, a Fulbright Scholar, and a Wilson Wyatt Fellow. She makes her home in Louisville with Lee, her husband and Emme, their daughter, and Bacsí, the family dog. Lee's and Elizabeth's son, Garrison is a student at Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio.



Rev. Sandra Moon, member-at-large, was born and raised in Toledo, Ohio to first generation Korean-American parents. She earned a B.A. in political science and religious studies from Vanderbilt University, an M.Div from Louisville Seminary, and a J.D. from the University of Louisville's Brandeis School of Law. Sandra is the Director of Admissions at Louisville Seminary. As a bi-vocational pastor, Sandra also maintains a solo law practice where she focuses on family law, estate planning, and business transactions. Sandra is an alum of the PC(USA) Young Adult Volunteer program, and she currently serves on the YAV Alum Leadership Council. She also serves as a supply pastor for congregations in Mid-Kentucky Presbytery and Ohio Valley Presbytery. Sandra enjoys cooking, traveling, hiking, and music. Her partner, Chris, is a public defender, and they live in Louisville with their two dogs.

Rev. Jihyun Oh: Jihyun is a teaching elder member of Greater Atlantic Presbytery currently serving as the Director of Mid Council Ministries for the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)'s Office of the General Assembly. Jihyun is a graduate of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Florida International University, and Columbia Theological Seminary.

Adebisi A. Shofu, MDiv., DMFJ, (who is commonly referred to as Bisi) is the Moderator of Presbyterian Women in the Synod of the Northeast (PWSNE). She serves on the Racial Equity Advocacy Committee (REAC) of the Office of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, USA (PCUSA) and served as liaison to the General Assembly Committee on Representation (GACOR). She has served on other commissions for the General Assembly. She runs a consulting business working with Non-Profits and other businesses. Bisi is the PCUSA representative to the National Council of Churches, serving on the Joint Action and Advocacy for Justice and Peace. She currently serves on Commission on Ministry (COM) for The Presbytery of the Coastlands.

She graduated with an MDiv. Degree from New Brunswick Theological Seminary, New Brunswick, New Jersey where she was the President of the Student Body championing the cause of the students. She earned a Certificate in Drum Major for Justice in Public Theology from Johnson C. Smith Theological Seminary.

She partnered with a fellow seminarian and friend to start a 501(3C) ministry to provide healthcare and educational training to the underserved communities, which she left to start her own Foundation. Adebisi serves as an advocate for her community as well as a counselor. She serves as a Chaplain at Skilled Nursing Facilities across New Jersey and she regularly preaches in many churches in her Presbytery, other Presbyteries and denominations.

Adebisi is Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) Disaster Preparedness Trainer whose responsibility is to educate churches and congregations on planning ahead to mitigate disasters. She specializes in educating people about health insurance programs, diversity training, self-help and self-improvement. She is a certified Transformation Life Coach.

She is the Visiting Chaplain for New Brunswick Presbyterian Church (NBPC), where she also served as the Director of Youth.



Rev. Dr. Gregory Simpson, member-at-large, is a recent Master of Divinity, and Master of Sacred Theology graduate of Union Theological Seminary as well as a PhD from the University of the West Indies in organic chemistry. He is the Pastor of Nauraushaun Presbyterian Church in Pearl River, NY and serves as the Treasurer of the Presbytery of Hudson River. Along with his pastoral responsibilities, Rev. Simpson served on the Ulster County 2040 strategic planning committee and is the co-founder of the Hudson Valley Environmental Justice Coalition, an informal coalition of 30 not-for-profit and faith organizations charged with lifting up voices of people of color working at the intersection of environmental and climate justice advocacy. He lives in upstate New York with wife Suzanne, and their two cats, Calvin and Luther.

Rev. Brenton Thompson, Presbyterian Mission Agency Board rep, lives in Phoenixville, Pennsylvania with his wife, Sudie, who is also a pastor, along with their two children. He serves as Pastor of Crossroads Presbyterian Church in Limerick, Pennsylvania in the Presbytery of Philadelphia, Synod of the Trinity.
