## **Responsive Litanies**

**A.** By Rev. Jasmine Evans & Rev. L. British Hyrams | Included in *God Is with Us in Every* Season

One: When we find ourselves at the intersections of life, we remind ourselves...

#### All: God, we know you are with us!

One: As we move to new places and meet new faces, we say...

# **D.** By Rev. Colin Pettigrew & Natarsha P. Sanders | Included in *Listening for Jesus' Instructions*

One: We are called by Jesus Christ to expand the Kin\*dom of God. We are drawn by Jesus Christ with love and compassion to live out the Good News, to love each other like Christ loves us, and to walk humbly with God.

All: They will know we are Christians by our love for all of humankind. They will know we are Christians by our appreciation of all of creation. Our lives are a reflection of the goodness of God.

I accept the call of God.** 

One: May we all be reminded today that we belong to the Lord. **All: Lord, I belong to you.** 

One: May we all be reminded today that we can depend on Jesus Christ. **All: Christ, I depend on you.** 

One: May we yield ourselves to the work and way of the Holy Spirit. **All: Holy Spirit, I yield to you.** 

(To those commissioned) One: You are a member of a community of believers. You are never alone. You are held in the daily grace of a fierce savior and in our love and prayers..

(To all gathered) One: You can lean on one another. You are a living demonstration that the Holy Spirit leads us. Follow the guidance of the Holy Spirit. As challenges arise, remember that you are called to this. As joys arise, remember that you are called to this. As weariness arises, remember that nothing shall separate any of us from the love of God in Christ Jesus.

**E.** Commissioning of a Campus Minister by Rev. Colin Pettigrew & Natarsha P. Sanders | Included in *Listening for Jesus' Instructions* 

One: Acknowledging Jesus Christ of Nazareth as your Savior, will you serve the people with love and compassion, energy and humility?

Campus Minister: Yes, I will.

One: Acknowledging the responsibility of this service, will you rely on the mercy of God and work toward justice?

Campus Minister: Yes, I will.

One: Acknowledging a community you can trust, will you seek help when necessary? You are not expected to do this work alone.

Campus Minister: I will ask for help when needed.
