Order of Worship

Call to Confession

Prayer of Confession

- If you are a young adult trying something new in life or carefully navigating current spaces and places, people and situations.
- If you, of any age, children through retirement, or someone you care about, are going through a time of transition in any aspect of life: physical health, mental health, relationships, employment, financial, educational, or spiritual.
- If you are willing to pray for others in a season of transition.

By now everyone should be standing, if not, ask everyone to stand or raise their hand. The following blessing may be extended before they are seated.

Brothers, Sisters, Siblings in Christ: rest assured in these promises: God is your helper. God is on your side. May the Lord of peace give you peace at all times and in all ways. Amen.

Sermon Starter

1 Kings 19:4-8

Elijah is in a time of transition. He has recently defeated the prophets of Baal and seems to be feeling inadequate saying, "I am no better than my ancestors..." Elijah is lamenting to God but is extremely tired. Before he goes to the next place God is calling him to, he needs to rest and fuel up for the journey.

Our transitions in life are the same. We often struggle with feelings of inadequacy, imposters syndrome. Thinking that the work we do in the world, the work we do for ourselves, and even the work we do for God simply isn't enough. God reminds us that in times of transition that we are enough. We have the ability to take the next steps if we rest in God and fuel up for the journey. God is with us every step of the way.

Our fuel is centered on the promises of God. With each new adventure in life, we can be reminded that God is with us. The preacher can use the promises of God to help young adults focus on how God provides for them at each transition. These promises are like the fuel that Elijah receives by way of food and rest. They fill us with hope for the journey, assurance when we are apprehensive, and peace when things are chaotic. The preacher should also think about making the sermon inclusive to college-aged young adults. All 17+ year olds are not headed to college and may in fact feel excluded or less than because of their choice to enter into the job arena or to take a gap year. The preacher should consider some of the transitions listed below:

- · Transitions out of high school
- Transitions to college or trade school
- Transitions to jobs, careers, or internships
- Transitions to a gap year
- From childhood to young adulthood
- From dependence to independence
- From living at home to campus living (with friends or on your own), or from campus/ dorm living to an apartment or house
- Leaving old friends, making new friends
- Navigating, establishing, and/or reaffirming their identity, core beliefs, and values

Sermon Illustrations

Rev. British Hyrams created a pen pal program between students and homebound or isolated members of NC Central's partner churches who support the ministry as a service project that could be done safely by students in the midst of COVID-19.² At the end of the semester she asked participating students to share their experiences (the ones who had heard back from their pen pals), and she received the following from Mia, a recent graduate in Graphic Design. Although not all of the students bonded with their pen pals as significantly as this student, Mia shares how connecting with one another can offer support and encouragement during every season of life:

"Nancy and I have been keeping in touch by sending at minimum two emails to one another every other week, yet there were times when we would send 5, 6, 7 or more -honestly, I began to lose track of the exact number! We have talked about everything under the sun from social justice, fitness routines, volunteering efforts, church involvement, politics, careers, travel history, family background, personal development, leadership positions, overcoming obstacles and so much more. She is one of the most selfless, loving and involved people that I've ever met. Nancy truly inspires me and I am beyond blessed that this ministry placed her in my life. This opportunity in fellowship with her makes me feel like I'm reconnecting with a long-lost friend.

"I told Nancy a few months ago that the more smiles I can put on people's faces, the better, and to let me know if she knew of anyone else that would be interested in me serving as their pen pal, too. She then introduced me to her friend, Walter, and now I serve as his pen pal as well. The three of us typically send three-way emails similar to a three-way phone call which allows the three of us to chit-chat with each other. This pen pal experience is priceless, life-changing, rewarding and comforting to say the least. Although I have graduated, I will keep in touch with my pen pals until the end of time because I love them to pieces. Feel free to share this story with the church either generally or specifically! (Preferably specifically because Nancy deserves recognition for simply being the phenomenal person that she is.)"
