



Older Adult Sunday Worship Liturgy and Celebration Ideas

The Presbyterian Church (USA) designates the *first Sunday of May* as the beginning of **Older Adult Week**, a time to honor older adults for their commitment to the life, witness, and ministry of the church. The timing may not work for your context...you may choose any Sunday for this celebration of Older Adults. The liturgy ideas, prayers and resources below can be used in a congregational worship or may be adapted for a retirement community or some other setting. Included are worship resources and ideas to celebrate and lift up ministry with Older Adults. The <u>PMA Office of Christian Formation</u> provides these resources in partnership with the <u>Presbyterian Older Adult Ministry Network</u> (POAMN).

Liturgy Resources

Call to Worship

One: I was glad when they said to me "Let us go to the house of the Lord."

All: We come running and on walkers, with hurried steps and halting to join together as your called together people.

One: This is the day you have made for us, our Creator, a day for us to join in praise and worship of you.

All: We give thanks for this day and for this world, for this whole creation which you have called good.

One: You gather us together as our good Shepherd.

All: For your care of us all of our lives we praise your name.

Unison Call to Worship (from Psalm 92)

One: It is a good thing to give thanks to the Lord, And to sing praises to your name, O Most High;

All: To tell of your loving-kindness early in the morning

And of your faithfulness in the night season;

On the psaltery, and on the lyre, And to the melody of the harp.

One: For you have made me glad by your acts, O Lord; And I shout for joy because of the works of your hands.

All: The righteous shall flourish like a palm tree,

And shall spread abroad like a cedar of Lebanon.

One: Those who are planted in the house of the Lord

Shall flourish in the courts of our God;

They shall still bear fruit in old age;

All: They shall be green and succulent;

That they may show how upright the Lord is,

My Rock, in whom there is no fault.

One: Creator God, You have planted your Word in our hearts

That you might harvest forth justice.

So root us in your love,
That we may always flourish,
Yielding all the fruits of the Spirit
From youth to old age;
Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Call to Worship

One: Lord, you have been our dwelling place for all generations.

All: We give thanks for the wisdom and the gifts those who have gone before us have shared with us.

Prayer of Confession (in unison)

Loving God, you provide everything we need, yet sometimes, we doubt there will be enough time, enough money, enough health, enough memory, enough compassion as we live out our days. We doubt when we need to have faith. We see the glass half empty when in fact it is half full. We know you are present, God with us, but in spite of ourselves we sometimes feel separated and lost. Forgive us when we rely too much on ourselves and not enough on you, for you are steadfast and strong, ready to meet our every need and receive every petition. Bless each of us, Lord, as we grow older, that we may mature in faith as well as in years. In your mercy, Lord, hear our prayers. Amen.

Assurance of Pardon: Hear the good news! In every time and place, in every age and in every space we are forgiven in Christ Jesus our Lord. Amen. (Jan L. McGilliard, POAMN Planning Guide 2016)

Prayer of Confession

Assurance of Pardon One: This the good news we have received that anyone, no matter what age or origin, or other status, is forgiven for when they have strayed from God and are now welcomed by God to the table God has spread before us if they put their trust in Jesus as Lord.

All: Thanks be to God for this good news.

Additional Worship Suggestions

Journey of Life Liturgy Resource

<u>This Quicksheet</u> content is another possibility for Older Adult Sunday Worship Liturgy around the theme of Journey of Life designed by Rev. Burnetta Armour.

Worship Leadership

Plan to have Older Adults lead worship by reading scripture, prayers, offering special music, or other expressions of leadership.

Sermon Ideas

Consider inviting a guest preacher who serves in ministry with Older Adults, is chaplain at a retirement center, or is a retired pastor.

Instead of having a pastor preach consider asking several Senior Adults to share "A Testimony to Light and Life" as suggested by Jan L. McGillard in 2016 POAMN Planning Guide.

Focus on wisdom and being wise in God's eyes. Bits of wisdom from the congregation could be shared especially regarding our relationship with God. And consider using Matthew 7:24-28, Job 28, Proverbs 1:1-7 or 1:20-33 as suggested by June Begany in the 2018 POAMN Planning Guide.

Planning and Leadership Idea

Match children, youth or younger members with older members at a planned community event. Ask the Older Adults to share what Bible verses or stories have been important to them with the others. Discover experiences that may go with these verses too. Then use some of these verses as the basis for a service for Older Adult Sunday. Perhaps the older adults could tell their stories as part of the service or as a time with children. The special verses might be printed or illustrated by these leaders for the bulletin cover or put up in the fellowship hall. Perhaps later in the year the younger members could be encouraged to share their own favorite or meaningful verses.

Worship Accessibility Audit:

Be intentional to think about how accessible worship is to people of all ages and abilities and changes that could be explored and experimented with for Older Adult Sunday. This might include bulletin size, font size or style, layout, or language. It might include worship space lighting, sound, seating options or arrangement or what is printed or projected. You might think about who is in leadership, where they stand and what language is spoken. If a service is streamed what can be included to make it more accessible. The Disability Inclusion Toolkit resource could direct you to other resources for accessibility in all areas of ministry.

Creative Ideas for Celebrating Old Adult Week

Interview Older Adults

A variety of media might be used for this interview: video, audio, printed, or pictures and stories in a variety of ways. In the interview, include ways that the person has been active in the church and community. Share parts of their stories with the congregation and on the Celebration Sunday.

Sharing Social

Have the Elementary children or youth host an intergenerational luncheon or "tea" party after worship to celebrate older adults. The young people can serve as table hosts bringing food to the table, serving drinks, and making conversation. Place table tents with basic get to know you questions on the table to share with questions like – What is a favorite book you have read as a child? What hobbies do you have? Tell about a pet. Where is somewhere you would like to travel?

Birthday Party

Have the children or youth host a birthday party for all those over 90 (80 or whatever year) Invite those folks to stay after worship or some other time for birthday cake or cookies and drinks. Have the kids decorate the tables (and the cookies maybe). Then recognize these Older Adults in worship by name.

Mission and Outreach

Choose an organization that supports Older Adults that you can highlight and collect funds and materials which are needed. Perhaps something for a local senior center or retirement center can be brought forth at the offering.

Or highlight the volunteer hours that Older Adults donate to various programs in your church and community.

Or plan an intergenerational outing to a retirement community or a senior member's house to do spring yard clean up, sing, or play bingo.

Resource Fair

Plan a "senior expo" or resource fair for Older Adult Week that shares services and resources available to older adults in your community and from your congregation.

Sunday School/Bible Study

Offer a special topical class around the time of Older Adult Sunday. Join older and younger classes together to listen to each other and share faith stories. Bring in a special speaker on a topic Older adults are requesting to learn about like end of life issues, preparing for aging place or moving, or spiritual practices.

Red Brick Church Memory Worship

Point Loma Community Presbyterian Church in San Diego CA has several 10 minute video worship services designed for sharing with people with Dementia. Consider sharing these with members to watch at home or share with leaders of a local memory care facility. Find them here.
