WORLD MISSION-THE AUGUST 1998 SURVEY

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OVERVIEW

The Presbyterian Panel consists of three nationally-representative samples of groups affiliated with the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.): members, elders (lay leaders), and ordained ministers (for analysis, split into two groups based on current call: *pastors*, serving in a congregation, and *specialized clergy*, serving elsewhere). New samples are drawn every three years.

These pages summarize major findings from the eighth survey completed by the 1997-1999 Panel, mailed in August 1998 (with returns accepted through November 1998). The first half uses text and graphics to highlight important and useful findings. An appendix follows with comparative tables that display the percentage distribution of responses to every question for each of the four Panel groups.

Response rates for this survey are: members, 44%; elders, 50%; pastors, 58%. Results are subject to sampling and other errors. As a general rule, differences of less than 6% are not statistically meaningful.

In this report, the term *median* refers to the middle number in an ordered distribution. For example, the median age for a group of people aged 12, 21, 28, 35, and 64 years would be 28 years. The term *mean* refers to the mathematical average of values in a distribution; in the example, the mean age would be calculated as: (12+21+28+35+64)/5, or 32 years.

HIGHLIGHTS

- ✓ Presbyterians hold generally positive and realistic images of world mission today.
- Clergy are more likely than laity to view world mission as modern, progressive, sensitive to other cultures, and enabling.
- ✓ The highest world mission priority in all samples is *leading people to faith in Jesus Christ*. Other high priorities include *helping others help themselves* and *combating hunger and malnutrition*.
- ✓ Clergy are especially interested in these mission priorities: strengthening churches and training church leaders.
- ✓ On average, panelists came close to estimating the percentage of the national budget of the PCUSA (23%) that goes for world mission.
- ✓ Almost one-half of pastors believe it is *essential* that the Worldwide Ministries Division of the PCUSA help congregations and presbyteries establish *personal contacts with PCUSA mission personnel*.
- ✓ Pastors report that about one-half of congregations either *always* or *usually* include world mission regularly in their worship and educational programs.
- ✓ The most common world mission activities in congregations include sermons, talks by mission workers, special-theme Sundays, use of the *Mission Yearbook for Prayer and Study*, and prayers for mission workers.
- ✓ Half of pastors report that their congregations have *increased* world mission involvement in the last five years, while only 5% report that such involvement has *decreased*.
- ✓ A fourth of members, a third of elders, four in ten specialized clergy, and six in ten pastors are *extremely* or *generally interested* in becoming more personally involved in world mission.
- ✓ Around four in ten panelists report that someone from their congregations has served overseas as a mission worker in the last five years, typically as a short-term volunteer. Most often, arrangements were coordinated by the congregation directly with the overseas host.
- ✓ A third of panelists directly support financially one or more world mission workers.
- ✓ The most familiar PCUSA world mission programs are the Presbyterian Hunger Program and Presbyterian Disaster assistance.
- ✓ Presbyterians see themselves as better informed about international events generally than about religious life overseas.
- ✓ A majority of members and elders believe themselves to be *poorly informed* or *very poorly informed* about the world mission of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).
- ✓ Large majorities of panelists have traveled outside the United States in the last decade, and many, especially among the clergy, have visited a mission worker while overseas.
- ✓ World trends expected to have the most impact on world mission in the next century include nationalism and conflict based on religion and ethnicity, the dramatic growth of the church in developing countries, and the widening gap in wealth between poor and rich countries.

IMAGES OF WORLD MISSION

Contrasting Images

Most of us are familiar in some way with Christian efforts to meet the spiritual needs of people in other parts of the globe. What pictures or words come to mind when the subject of "world mission" is put before us? We've all heard stories, listened to talks, seen the slides of those who have gone abroad, whether for a week or for a lifetime, in the service of the church. What impressions have those experiences left on us?

The initial question on the survey asked panelists to choose between pairs of contrasting images, to indicate which one—or which combination—provides the better description of their own mental picture of world mission today.

In general, panelists shun extremes. While a few individuals see world mission as being all of one thing and nothing of another, overall, views hover around the midpoint. Collectively, Presbyterians view mission as a mixture of contrasting skills and practices, maybe a bit more of one alternative than another, but generally a lot of both. On a scale of 1 to 7, with 4 as the midpoint, group averages typically fall between 3 and 5 for each contrasting pair of possible descriptors. Overall, the pairs of terms that are rated as nearly-equally descriptive of world mission (scale scores between 3.5 and 4.5 for a majority of Panel groups) are:

- ✓ progressive, out-dated
- ✓ focused, scattered
- ✓ something young adults do, something older adults do
- ✓ traditional, modern
- ✓ carried out by Americans, carried out by citizens of other countries
- ✓ something a specialist does, something a generalist does
- ✓ something that laity do, something that clergy do
- ✓ a special call, every Christian's call

Slightly more extreme skews (means around 3 or below, or around 5 and above) on other pairs of terms tell us that panelists generally perceive world mission as somewhat more:


- ✓ sacrificial than selfish
- ✓ concerned with serving others than with being served
- ✓ sensitive to other cultures than indifferent to other cultures
- ✓ sharing the Gospel than sharing American culture
- ✓ enabling than controlling
- ✓ difficult to do than easy to do
- ✓ joyful than stern
- ✓ respectful of other beliefs than contemptuous of other beliefs

Members and elders reveal very similar average scale scores on all of the pairs of terms, but pastors (and less often, specialized clergy) often differ by a small but noticeable amount from their lay counterparts. Compared to the lay samples, pastors view world mission as *relatively*:

- ✓ more joyful, less stern
- ✓ more progressive, less out-dated
- ✓ more modern, less traditional
- ✓ more carried out by citizens of other countries, less carried out by Americans
- ✓ more something a specialist does, less something a generalist does
- ✓ more democratic, less authoritarian
- ✓ more sharing the Gospel, less sharing American culture
- ✓ more respectful of other beliefs, less contemptuous of other beliefs
- ✓ more sensitive to other cultures, less indifferent to other cultures
- ✓ more enabling, less controlling

How Images Vary


Views of world mission are affected by other characteristics of panelists. For example:

- ✓ Member panelists who see themselves as *well-informed* about "Christian mission activity around the world" are much more likely than *poorly* or *very poorly informed* members to view world mission as:
 - something young (as opposed to something older) adults do
 - progressive (as opposed to out-dated)
 - sharing the Gospel (as opposed to sharing American culture)
 - enabling (as opposed to controlling)
- ✓ More older member panelists (aged 70+) than younger ones (less than age 40) view world mission as:
 - something clergy (as opposed to laity) do
 - selfish (as opposed to sacrificial)
 - respectful of (as opposed to contemptuous of) other beliefs
 - every Christian's (as opposed to a special) call
- ✓ Few differences in views of world mission are associated with theological orientation. Theologically-liberal members hold similar average views on world mission as theologically-conservative members.

Ranking Mission Activities

- ✓ From a list of 29 possible PCUSA mission activities, members give the highest priority to:
 - leading people to faith in Christ
 - helping others help themselves
 - combating hunger and malnutrition
 - providing spiritual guidance
 - · teaching basic literacy
 - · providing medical care
 - fighting disease
 - · combating poverty

- ✓ Pastors give relatively high priority to many of the same activities, but also give high priority to "strengthening churches" and "training church leaders."
- ✓ Among members and pastors, relatively low priority is found for:
 - resolving conflicts between nations
 - promoting democracy
 - resolving conflicts between faith groups
 - promoting interfaith cooperation
 - · providing advanced education
 - preserving the environment

Mission Emphasis: Body or Soul?

A look at the ratings panelists give to mission priorities suggests that Presbyterians want the church to minister to body, mind, and spirit in its overseas work. But make no mistake: faith comes first. Majorities in every sample (54% of specialized clergy, 57% of members, 62% of elders, and 72% of pastors) believe it is essential that the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) make "leading people to faith in Jesus Christ" a "part of its world mission outreach." Still, ranked not far behind are efforts are improve the physical (e.g., "combating hunger and nutrition," "providing medical care"), economic ("helping people help themselves," "combating poverty"), and social ("teaching basic literacy," "working for human rights") circumstances people face. In short, Presbyterians want the Gospel to be foremost among mission endeavors, but it is a Gospel that attends to whole people, not just souls.

The Budget for World Mission

What proportion of expenditures by national entities of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) goes for world mission? The Worldwide Ministries Division calculates the share at about 23%. When we asked panelists to estimate the value, they came fairly close—as a group. However, many individuals gave numbers well above or below the actual figure:



Mission Services to Congregations & Presbyteries

- ✓ According to members, few "mission-related services or programs" are *essential* for the Worldwide Ministries Division of the PCUSA to provide for congregations and presbyteries. The highest percentages of *essential* responses are found for:
 - briefings about ways to spend mission dollars (13% of members so respond)
 - people-to-people exchanges (11%)
 - briefings about the church in other countries (10%)
 - reports about the impact of PCUSA mission around the world (10%)
 - promotion of opportunities to serve internationally (10%)
- ✓ Pastors are much more likely than laity to see the importance of the WMD providing each of various mission-related services to congregations and presbyteries. The highest percentages of *essential* responses are found for:
 - personal contacts with PCUSA mission personnel (43%)
 - reports about the impact of PCUSA mission around the world (32%)
 - promotion of opportunities to serve internationally (31%)
 - opportunities for mission trips to other countries (30%)
 - assessment and placement of mission personnel (28%)
 - people-to-people exchanges (27%)
- ✓ Panelists in all samples place the *least* relative importance on the provision of "a global mission magazine" by the Worldwide Ministries Division. More than a third of members and elders, and one in four pastors and specialized clergy, see such a periodical as *not too important* or *not at all important*. Even here, however, large minorities, especially among pastors (37%) and specialized clergy (33%), view such a publication as *essential* or *very important* for the church to provide.

Mission Resource Priorities and Theological Orientation

Theological liberals and conservatives hold similar views on the relative importance of the PCUSA providing mission-related services to congregations and presbyteries. As Table 3 shows, the largest differences are still relatively small, on the order of 8-10 percentage points. They show that conservatives put more emphasis than liberals on the church providing "opportunities for mission trips to other countries," while liberals put more emphasis than conservatives on "people-to-people exchanges." These two types of programs sound a lot alike, don't they? But the former connotes more of a one-way emphasis, while the latter sounds more bi-directional. Could it simply be that conservatives are more likely to favor an older, "us-to-them" mission style, while theological liberals are more likely to support a reciprocal arrangement?

What Congregations Are Doing

- ✓ Around one in six pastors (18%) and elders (18%) respond yes, always when asked whether their churches "regularly include world mission in . . . worship and educational programs." Another third report that their congregation usually includes world mission in its programming. Only 1% of elders and pastors report that their church never does so.
- ✓ A majority of pastors (52%) and four in ten elders (41%) report that their congregations have *increased* their level of world mission involvement over that of five years ago. Only one in 20 pastors or elders believe that the level of involvement has *decreased*.
- ✓ Beyond Shared Mission Support and the One Great Hour of Sharing offering, eight in ten pastors (81%) report that their congregations have made a *direct* contribution to one or more world mission programs.

Where's the Direct Mission Support Going?

As just noted, most congregations, according to their pastors, made some sort of direct contribution to a mission program over the past two years. What entities got the money? Of all pastors:

40% report that their congregations gave to one or more official programs of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)
21% report that their congregations gave to one or more of the three independent (but PCUSA "validated")
mission support groups (i.e., the Medical Benevolence Foundation, the Outreach Foundation, the
Presbyterian Frontier Fellowship)

68% report that their congregations gave to one or more non-PCUSA-related mission programs 22% did not report any direct support

Add those numbers together, and the total far exceeds 100% because some pastors listed a program or programs in more than one category. Here is a look at the relative overlap:

8% gave to programs in all three categories (PCUSA, Validated, and Other)

7% gave only to PCUSA programs

1% gave only to Validated programs

28% gave only to Other programs

2% gave to PCUSA and Validated programs, but not to any Other programs

23% gave to PCUSA and Other programs, but not to Validated programs


9% gave to Validated and Other programs, but not to PCUSA programs

22% gave to no programs

- ✓ A majority of pastors report that in their congregations over the last two years the following mission-related events or activities took place:
 - had a sermon or sermons on world mission (84% so report)
 - hosted a talk given by a current or former mission worker (72%)
 - prayed for a mission worker (66%)
 - used the Mission Yearbook for Prayer and Study (65%)
 - observed a special-theme Sunday on world mission (65%)
 - directed financial support to a specific person serving in mission (63%)
 - had an on-going committee on world mission (60%)
 - had one or more members travel out of the country for mission learning or service (54%)
 - received regular correspondence from a mission worker (58%)
- ✓ Relatively rare mission-related activities in congregations, according to pastors, include:
 - helping locally with refugee resettlement (17%)
 - advocating public policy on global issues (15%)
 - ministering to migrant workers (12%)
 - sponsoring an ESL (English as a Second Language) program (12%)
 - hosting a colleague in ministry from another country (11%)
- ✓ Except for sermons on world mission and use of the *Mission Yearbook*, world mission events and programs of various types are much more frequently found in larger-membership congregations, especially in very large ones (750+ members). For example, 27% of congregations with fewer than 150 members report a "special study of world mission" in the prior two years, compared to 28% in congregations with 150-299 members, 49% in congregations with 300-749 members, and 65% in congregations with 750 or more members.

Increase or Not?

Name a world mission-related activity that could take place in a congregation, and any one that you mention is more likely to have occurred in those congregations that, according to pastors, *increased* their "involvement in world mission" over the last five years. What's going on here? It may simply be that pastors don't perceive increases in involvement unless they involve a lot of dimensions. But another explanation is possible: increasing involvement is catching!

Mission Workers and Congregations

- Four in ten pastors report that at least one person from their congregation has "served as a mission worker outside the U.S." at some time during the previous five years. The median number of mission workers from each congregation that reported at least one such worker is three. The mean is 15. According to pastors, in one of every six congregations (18%), more than 20 mission workers have served in other countries over the last five years, including a few that have sent 100 or more mission workers.
- ✓ Most mission workers from PCUSA congregations spent a relatively brief time on their assignment: according to pastors, 79% served 3 months or less. Only 8% served more than a year.
- ✓ Assignments for about one-half of mission workers from PCUSA congregations were arranged directly between the congregation and the overseas host. In another quarter, arrangements were coordinated by "other denominations or independent mission agencies." Only 20% served on an assignment arranged by the PCUSA's Worldwide Ministries Division.
- ✓ Larger-membership congregations are more likely to report that one or more of their members traveled individually overseas for "brief mission learning or service." Group travel of this kind is especially concentrated in larger churches; while 12% of congregations with fewer than 150 members reported group travel for mission, 67% of congregations with 750 or more members did so.
- ✓ One in 20 members, one in 12 elders, and one in 4 pastors and specialized clergy report that they themselves have "served in mission outside the U.S."
- ✓ Majorities in all Panel samples, ranging from 70% of members to 94% of pastors, report that they "personally know one or more persons who are (or have been) in mission service outside the U.S."


Other Personal Involvement

- ✓ Around a third of members (29%), elders (33%), pastors (38%), and specialized clergy (36%) report that, in the previous two years, they or someone in their households had "directly supported a [world] mission worker or program"
- ✓ Almost one-half of members (46%), and majorities of the other samples (56% of elders, 62% of specialized clergy, and 72% of pastors) report that in the two prior years they had "attended a seminary, conference, worship service or other church-related . . . meeting at which a person in world mission service was the primary speaker."

Familiarity with PCUSA and Other Mission Programs

- ✓ Only three (of 14 listed) PCUSA mission programs are either *very familiar* or *generally familiar* to 10% or more of members:
 - Presbyterian Hunger Program (24% so report)
 - Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (19%)
 - Mission Volunteers (10%)
- ✓ The PCUSA mission programs most familiar to pastors are:
 - Presbyterian Hunger Program (80% either very familiar or generally familiar)
 - Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (78%)
 - Self Development of People (63%)
 - Year with Latin Americans (55%)
 - Year with Africa (54%)
 - Mission Volunteers (52%)

Fewer than 10% of members and elders are either very familiar or generally familiar with these validated mission support groups affiliated with the PCUSA: the Medical Benevolence Foundation (9% familiar), Outreach Foundation (9%), and the Presbyterian Frontier Fellowship (4%). Relatively more elders report familiarity with each, at 17%, 13%, and 6%, respectively. Pastors, by contrast, report much greater relative familiarity than either group of laity, with 61% either very familiar or generally familiar with the Medical Benevolence Foundation, 53% with Outreach Foundation, and 32% with the Presbyterian Frontier Fellowship.


Among laity, some prominent nondenominational mission programs are better known than most of those sponsored by the PCUSA, including:

- Habitat for Humanity (77% of members and 83% of elders either very familiar or generally familiar)
- World Vision (24% and 24%, respectively)
- Wycliffe (19% and 20%)
- Youth with a Mission (10% and 10%)
- ✓ Habitat for Humanity is very familiar or generally familiar to nine in every ten pastors and specialized clergy, and World Vision is very familiar or generally familiar to 54% of pastors and 37% of specialized clergy.

Interest in Mission and the World

✓ 5% of members, 7% of elders, 27% of pastors, and 16% of specialized clergy are very interested "in becoming more personally involved in world mission" Another 18%, 22%, 35%, and 24%, respectively, are generally interested in becoming more involved. Still, 48% of members, 37% of elders, 12% of pastors, and 26% of specialized clergy are either not very interested or not at all interested in greater personal involvement.

- One in six members and elders, one in four pastors, and one in three specialized clergy believe it is essential for them "to stay informed about news and events outside the U.S." Many others believe it is very important to stay informed, so that, overall, 56% of members, 51% of elders, 72% of pastors, and 79% of specialized clergy find it either essential or very important to stay abreast of world news. Nevertheless, only 23% of members and elders, 30% of pastors, and 36% of specialized clergy "regularly read or listen to any news source published or broadcast from outside the U.S...."
- Few panelists in any sample consider themselves very well informed about international events. Only 7% of members and elders, 12% of pastors, and 16% of specialized clergy so report. Few, however, consider themselves either poorly informed or very poorly informed. Together, a large majority in every sample (72% or above) considers itself either well informed or somewhat informed.
- ✓ Presbyterians see themselves as better informed about the general international scene than about "religious life in other parts of the world." Only 11% of members, 10% of elders, 35% of pastors, and 30% of specialized clergy consider themselves well informed or very well informed about religion outside the U.S. Indeed, 41% of members, 31% of elders, 15% of pastors, and 13% of specialized clergy consider themselves to be poorly informed or very poorly informed on this subject.
- ✓ Most panelists consider themselves no better than *somewhat informed* about "Christian mission activity around the world," in general, and "the world mission activity of the PCUSA," in particular. In fact, a majority of members and elders report that they are either *poorly informed* or *very poorly informed* about PCUSA world mission. Even 19% of pastors and 31% of specialized clergy so report.

Familiarity Breeds Support

As already noted, many panelists—ranging from 38% of pastors to 29% of members—indicate that they, or someone else in their household, have "directly supported a mission worker or program in the last 2 years." Those providing support are much more likely to have been abroad or to have had other sorts of contact or involvement with world mission.



- ✓ In every sample, a majority report at least one trip outside the United States in the last decade, ranging from 60% of members to 78% of specialized clergy. Relatively few of the lay international travelers visited a "mission worker or mission facility" during their overseas journey (12% of the members, 18% of the elders), but mission visits were included in at least one trip of 57% of the traveling pastors and 45% of the traveling specialized clergy. Overall, 7% of members, 11% of elders, 42% of pastors, and 35% of specialized clergy have visited at least one mission worker or facility outside the U.S. during the last ten years.
- ✓ Relatively few panelists consider themselves fluent in a foreign language. Just 10% of members, 9% of elders, 22% of pastors, and 25% of specialized clergy report that they "speak or read easily" any language besides English. European languages are most often listed; among pastors who speak or read at least one foreign language, 38% list French, 37% list Spanish, and 32%, German.

Future Outlook

Looking back, it's clear that world mission activity has changed dramatically over the last century. Given the pace of change generally, it seems reasonable to expect world mission to look quite different a few decades hence. What are the forces and factors that will most shape world mission in the 21st Century?

We asked panelists to give their opinions by commenting on the extent to which they expect that each of 13 trends "will affect world mission in the 21st Century." The five response choices ranged from very great extent to not at all. Assigning each choice a number, from "5" for very great extent to "1" for not at all, we obtain a rough indicator of average opinions for each trend. The results are displayed in Table 7.

A clear division is found between responses of lay and clerical panelists. On average, ministers generally see each of the trends as having more of an impact on world mission than do members and elders. The principal exception is "the rapid spread of infectious diseases," which laity are more likely to rate as having an effect on mission than are clergy.

Future Outlook

(Continued)

Even among clergy, few trends are rated on average as affecting world mission to a *great extent* (i.e., a mean value of 4.00 or greater). The highest mean value in all samples is found for "nationalism and conflict based on religion and ethnicity" (mean = 4.21 for pastors, 4.27 for specialized clergy) Other trends expected to have relatively great impact on world mission are (in order according to pastors' responses): "the dramatic growth of the church in developing countries" (4.15); "the spread of Islam" (4.08); "the increase in direct mission activity by congregations and presbyteries" (4.02); "the acceleration of information technology" (4.00); and "the widening gap in wealth between poor and rich countries" (4.00). The least impact, in a relative sense, in found for: "the rapid spread of infectious diseases" (3.21); "environmental concerns" (3.21); "increasing size and power of multinational corporations" (3.23); "the growing Pentecostal/charismatic movement" (3.40); and the "emergence of a new generation of leaders who grew up after colonialism ended" (3.46).

In sum, in all samples, greater consequence is seen for trends with religious content, although broader developments, particularly growth in technology and in social inequality, are also seen as having considerable impact. The relatively small average effect that is foreseen due to infectious diseases suggests some lack of information on the state of public health in many parts of the world, including Africa, where large minorities of the population are already infected with the AIDS virus. Interestingly, a look at how members' opinion varies by education level finds that *more educated* individuals are *less likely* than others to believe that infectious diseases will have a great impact on world mission. Members with the most formal education (i.e., one or more graduate degrees), on average, view several other factors as more consequential for world mission, particularly "nationalism and conflict based on religion and ethnicity."
